This piece was originally intended for three solo voices, but it can be sung by three soloists with chorus, or by one soloist (mezzo-soprano) with chorus, or the whole may be sung *tutti*. It is clear that by using dialect the poet wished to suggest a certain roughness of language. This should be maintained in performance but singers must take care to avoid undue exaggeration.
