# Cloudy D

To play Cloudy D, move both hands up a 2nd from the C Major five-finger position.\* RH reads space note 3rds; LH reads line note 3rds.



<sup>\*</sup>Playing the same piece on different notes is called **transposing**.


#### Half Steps and Whole Steps

A **half step** is the distance from one key to the very next key, with no key between.

Half steps can look three different ways on the keyboard:












A whole step is the distance from one key to the very next key with one key between. Whole steps can look four different ways on the keyboard:










## **Two Minuets**



A dot above or below a note means to play **staccato:** short and detached.

II. G Minor


Any Major five-finger position becomes minor when the 3rd is lowered a half step.





### More About Five-Finger Positions

All Major five-finger positions have the same pattern of whole steps and half steps: whole-whole-half-whole. C Major and G Major have the half steps on white keys. (See Unit Two, page 19.)



Major five-finger positions can be built starting on any note, using the same pattern of whole and half steps.



<sup>\*</sup> Sharps or flats remain in effect for an entire measure. The barline cancels a sharp or flat.




#### Circuitous

### The Streets of Laredo

The LH uses intervals as accompaniment rather than chords. However, the intervals, in combination with the melody, form I and V7 chords.



#### **Classic Minuet**

The LH uses neither chords nor intervals for accompaniment. However, the LH notes, in combination with the RH melody, strongly suggest the chords. This is called implied harmony.
