INSTRUMENTATION:

The accompaniment is scored for either 2 Flutes and Bass Drum or Organ. Other solutions are possible, providing that the gentle and mysterious atmosphere is preserved, as on the recording (see below for details). For example, the Flutes might be replaced by Harp or by pizzicato Violins; if a manuals-only Organ is used, the pedal part might be played on either Double Bass or Bass Drum (or even both); or the Organ itself might be replaced by electronic Keyboards.

DURATION: 2' 40" approx.

The original version of *Snowflakes* formed part of the 'Winter Night' section of the cantata *A Time to Dance* for soloists, choir and orchestra (EP 73023), commissioned by the Summer Music Society of Dorset in celebration of its 50th anniversary, and first performed by Ex Cathedra, conducted by Jeffrey Skidmore at Sherborne Abbey, 9 June 2012.

This stand-alone version was first sung by the Ex Cathedra Choir with Andrew Fletcher (organ), conducted by Jeffrey Skidmore, at their 'Christmas Music by Candlelight' concert at St John's Smith Square, London, 13 December 2012.
