Fact file

- **F major** has a key signature of one flat – B \flat . All the Bs in a piece in F major will be flat, unless cancelled by a natural (♮).
- A dot after a note makes the note half as long again. A **dotted crotchet/quarter note** (♫) has the same duration as .
- A **canon** is another word for a 'round'.
- **mp** (*mezzo-piano*) means 'medium soft'.

Simple F major scale


Try this scale with different rhythmic patterns, as in *Fish 'n' chips variation* (p. 24).



Simple F major arpeggio





Fingering chart

The cornet and trumpet are both similar to a bugle.

Each plays an identical pattern of notes when no valves are pressed down.

Putting down one or more valves lengthens the tube and changes the pitch of the pattern.

Top tip

Also try this with all three valves down.
