Suggested period: Classical (regular phrases, diatonic harmony, repetitive and

simple rhythms).



Diatonic (and some bi-tonal) harmony

Ternary form with regular phrase lengths

Some bi-tonal harmony

Suggested period: 20th century (Neo-classical in style).



Scalic/arpeggiated melody

Imitative and sequential contrapuntal writing

First modulation is to the dominant

Suggested period: Baroque



Harmony mostly diatonic but with some occasional chromatic chords

Mostly in the tonic key but with a clear modulation to supertonic minor

in the second phrase

Texture mostly chordal (homophonic)

Expressive use of dynamics and some rubato

Suggested period: Romantic

- 1. Erratic tempo, dubious sense of phrasing and shape
- 2. Expressive and indulgent, lots of rubato
- 3. Very fast, staccato
